**Directions:** Read the following text and then discuss the connection questions that follow.

There is no denying the popularity of action films. They are watched and loved by people all over the world, and they are a serious player in the film industry. In 2023, in the US and Canada alone, action films accounted for 43% of the box office revenue. That is more than any other genre of film. Not only that, the revenue share of the next most popular genre, adventure, trailed behind action films by 20%. It's safe to say that action is the best film genre. You only have to look at the top three grossing films ever to know that this is true. *Avatar*, *Avengers: End Game*, and *Avatar: The Way of Water* are all action films.<sup>1</sup>

People watch films to be entertained, to be taken to other worlds and action films do exactly that. They are not like the boring arthouse films that show shots of trees blowing in the wind for ten minutes (which, let's be honest, is like watching paint dry).
